Minimum Wage etc (from April 2021)

The minimum wage per hour organisations have to pay is:

- Under the age of 18 is £5.28
- 18 to 20 years old is £7.49
- 21 to 22 years old is £10.18
- 23 and over £10.42

Tax, National Insurance etc

Income Tax:

- If you are paid less than £12,500 per year you do not pay income tax (Personal Tax Allowance)
- For every £1 you earn over £12,500 you get charged tax of 20%

If you earn over £182.69 per week you pay some national insurance

If you earn over £118 per week you can sign up to your organisation's pension scheme



Contract

Whatever job you do, you should be given a contract. At a minimum this will state:

- Number of hours you work each week
- The rate you will be paid (don't forget it MUST be at least the minimum wage)
- Your paid holiday entitlement
- Type of contract for example Christmas temporary, zero-hours, permanent

 If you work over 6 hours in a day, you have to be given a break of at least 20 minutes.

Although this doesn't have to be a paid

break.

You can only work a maximum of 48

hours per week.

You should have a gap of 11 hours

between shifts

Work experience

- The Council may be able to offer work experience placements
- These will be short term placements
- The placements will be unpaid

Getting a new job is very exciting. However do you know your rights when in work? This guide will explain what you need to know- starting with some legal stuff.

Transition Support

For the first four weeks of your apprenticeship/ employment, if needed, you will be able to receive the following from Isle of Anglesey Council:

A living allowance equivalent to the state benefit allowance

- •A grant to purchase interview/work clothes
- •A travel card for your commute to/from work
- •A one off payment to purchase equipment necessary for your job



Whatever type of contract you have. You MUST be given some paid holiday entitlement.

Work and Universal Credit

- Even if you work, you may be able to claim some Universal Credit payments.
- Whether it affects your benefits depends on the amount you earn.
- If it does affect your benefits they will reduce by 63p for every £1 you earn
- Speak to your Job Centre Work Coach or Ynys Môn Citizens Advice for help



You need to know your National Insurance Number when you start work and prove your identity with a driving licence or similar document

The organisation that gives you a job also has some health and safety responsibilities.....

Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)

- If where you work carries some risk that can't be avoided, such as a building site, the organisation MUST provide appropriate safety equipment to you FREE.
- This might include steel toe capped boots, a hard hat, work gloves, protective goggles/glasses etc
- The organisation might ask you to buy them and then pay you back.

Uniforms

If you have to wear a uniform with the organisation logo on:

- The organisation is likely to give this to you for free
- You will need to give it back when you leave

CSCS Card

- If you want to work on a construction site for example as a bricklayer, you are likely to need a CSCS Card to prove you have suitable qualifications to be on site.

If you have to wear a uniform to go to work and you are earning enough to pay income tax, you can claim some money back for the cost of washing it.



They also have to pay for glasses you need to use when working on the computer


Going back a couple of steps. How do you find work in the first place? There is plenty of help on hand.....

The Application

- Take time on each application- this will show you care about the role
- Make sure what you say is relevant to the post-talk about what skills you have that are useful in the role
- Sell yourself- speak confidently about what you can do
- Check your application before you send it
- Use a CV builder such as that on www.careerswales.com

Did you know?

 You may be able to claim the money back for travel to an interview. Ask your job centre advisor or personal advisor

The interview

Well Done! Getting an interview is an amazing achievement. Here are some hints.....

- Leave plenty of time to arrive for the interview
- Dress appropriately, if in doubt dress smart
- Be enthusiastic
- Answer all questions clearly
- Make sure to ask some questions at the end

Get someone to read your application before you send it.


Things to take to an interview

To help you feel prepared make sure you take:


- ID- driving licence/passport
- National Insurance Number
- Proof of address- for example bank statement
- Pen and paper
- Some questions to ask at the interview



You may be able to apply for money from social services for interview clothes.







If you are not quite ready for work or think you need to gain some experience, think about volunteering.

Benefits of volunteering

- Increase your experience
- Allow you to learn new skills
- Give you a chance to meet new people
- Make you feel good
- Get you into a routine



- Volunteering should cost nothing as you get paid your travel expenses
- Keep your tickets/receipts
