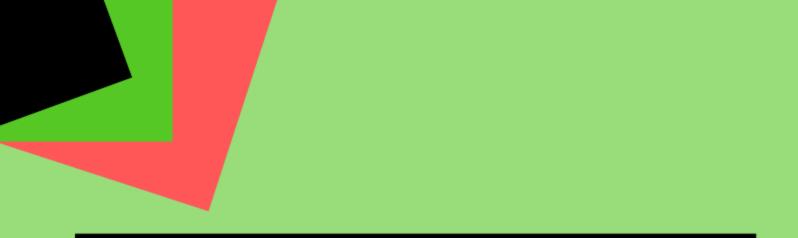

If you are looking to go to College there is support available to you. Let's start with grants.

Education Maintainance Allowance (EMA)

This is an allowance you receive when you attend College. You:

- must be 16-18
- must live in a house with low income
- will receive £30 per week
- must carry on attending College to carry on receiving the money

Apply for this by end June before your course starts.

Princes Trust

For young people aged 16-30 You can apply for help towards the cost of:

- · course fees
- equipment

You have to be:

- studying less than 14 hours per week or not in compulsory education
- unemployed or working less than 16 hours per week

You may be able to get financial support from Bridgend college which covers

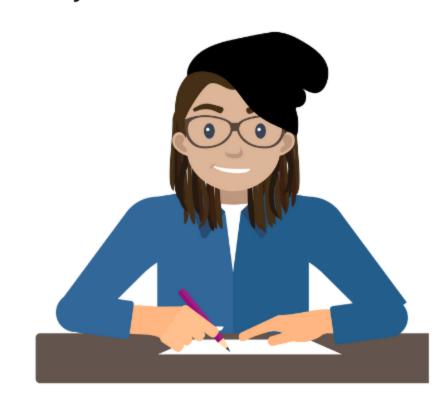
- Travel
- Meals
- Childcare costs
- Course related equipment

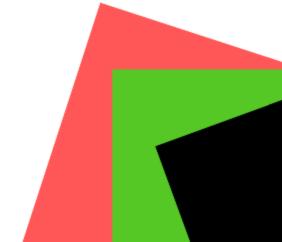

Welsh Government Learning Grant

If you are aged 19+ you can get some support towards the cost of studying:

- you can get up to £1500 for a full time course
- you can get up to £750 for a part time course
- how much you get depends on your income
 It is recommended you apply by end June before your course starts.

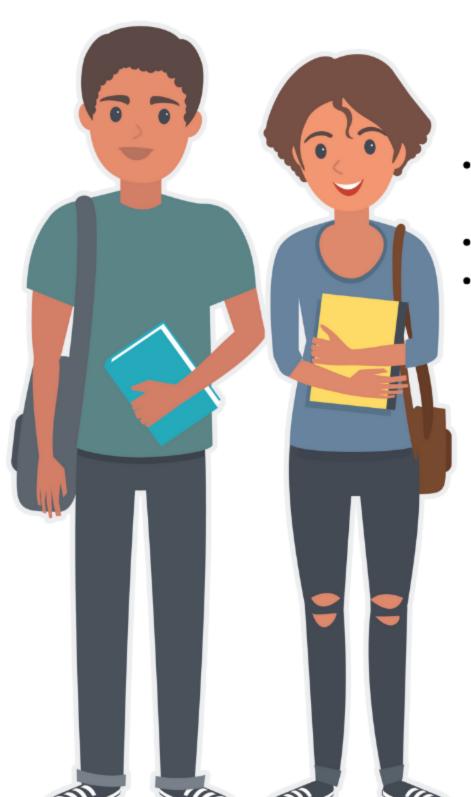

Financial Contingency Fund

- Wellbeing Support

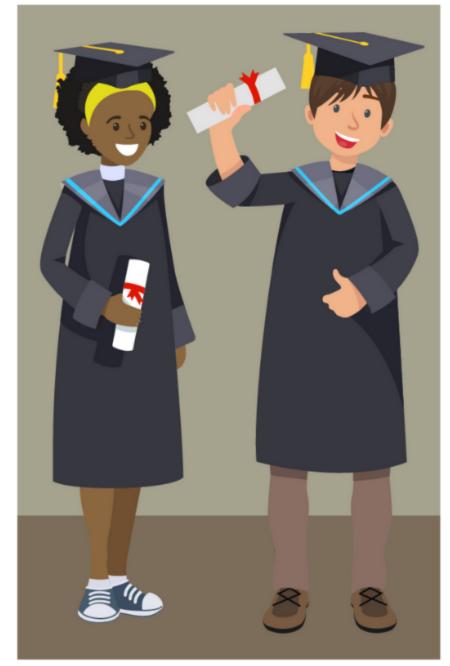

Been to College and thinking about the next step? Here we will look at support you can receive if you want to go to University

Higher Education Bursary

- You are entitled to a Higher Education Bursary
- This is worth £2000
- It is paid by your local Council
- You do not need to pay this back
- Ask you personal advisor about this



The University you are applying to may have its own

Maintenance Loan

- You can apply for a maintenance loan.
- The amount you receive depends on your income
- If you are on a low household income some of the money you receive may also be a grant which means you won't have to pay some of the money back.

Special Support Grant

This is available to:

- · Single parents
- Those on the housing related part of Universal Credit

If you are eligible for this grant you could receive £5,161 per year

Welsh Government Learning Grant

- The amount you get as a grant will depend on your income
- The higher the income the less you receive!



University of South Wales has a nominated team that can offer support to care experienced young people. Their main jobs are as Student Finance Officers, therefore you can go to meet them without people knowing you are care experienced:

Thinking of going to University? Here you can get a flavour of what support is available at University South Wales and Cardiff University.

Pre-entry support

If you have said you are care experienced in your application or at your College, the University and/or its partners will:

- Support you to attend open days
- Offer the chance to go to summer schools
- Help with your interview
- Support you with student finance



- Make sure you state on your UCAS application that you are a care experienced young person
- This helps the University give you better support

On campus support

The amount of support you get depends on how much you need but could include:

- · Regular meetings with support staff
- · Access to a mental health service
- · Access to a wellbeing service
- Study skills support
- Access to 'Big White Wall' online mental health support

Money!

There are a number of financial initatives run by the University to support you:

- The University will support you with ensuring you are getting the correct money from Student Finance
- A bursary- where you could claim up to £1000
- Hardship Fund- for any student if things are really tough financially
- Residential bursary- you could apply to this fund to help towards rent etc
- Books- there is a fund you can apply to for help to pay for essential course books

Wellbeing

- Going to University can be stressful
- It may involve big changes such as moving to a new area, making new friends etc.
- Make sure you look after your mental health and wellbeing to ensure you keep a positive state of mind
